This year we replaced 12 poolside tables and received the necessary spare umbrella parts at a cost of \$15,500. Please help us reduce umbrella damage by closing your umbrella during times with high winds and when you leave the pool. The automated chemical controller for the big pool needed to be replaced before the pool opened at a cost of \$2370.00. A gate alarm was installed on the North Gate and some security cameras either added or repaired.

The Board of Directors and Conservatory Committee Leadership helped residents with pool access over the Memorial Day Weekend. Here are a few important reminders.

Reminder - If you are one of the 208 households who are behind in paying your assessments, pool privileges have been revoked. (Key cards and cell phone app access turned off).

Reminder - Lifeguards should not be asked to open the gate. Residents are asked NOT TO LET OTHERS GAIN ACCESS. Safety and security are a responsibility we all share.

Reminder - If you are new to the community, replaced your cell phone since last summer or want to add additional family access to the pool please contact the Community Manager.

Reminder – Lifeguards are not a substitute for parental supervision. Groups disrupting the enjoyment of the pool for others, swimmers who do not obey pool rules and repeat offenders will be asked to leave and pool privileges revoked for the summer.

Reminder – Hard balls are not allowed, and <u>any balls</u> will be prohibited if the behavior of those using them disrupts others in the pool. Any pool toys or large inflatables are only allowed at the discretion of the lifeguards.

The Weeds are Back!

With lush greenery and longer days, it's a beautiful time to enjoy our neighborhood. We are fortunate to live in a community that is well-maintained and offers mature trees, parks, and views. As we take in the season, we've noticed a rise in weeds—particularly in side yards, driveways, and landscaped areas with decorative rock.

As a friendly reminder, our community guidelines ask all residents to keep yards, backyards, and surrounding areas well-maintained and free from unsightly conditions—including overgrown weeds. While weeding may not be the most exciting chore, it plays a big role in preserving the beauty and standards of our community.

That said, here are some effective and manageable strategies to help keep your property weed-free:

1. Utilize Natural Weed Control Methods

Consider the following homemade weed killer recipe:

• Ingredients:

- 1 gallon of white vinegar (5% acidity)
- o 1 cup of salt
- o 1 tablespoon of dish soap

• Instructions:

- Mix the ingredients thoroughly.
- o Pour the solution into a spray bottle.
- Apply directly to the leaves of unwanted weeds on a sunny day for optimal effectiveness.

Note that this mixture is non-selective and will kill any plant it contacts, so use it carefully around desirable plants; while effective, it won't prevent new weeds so it's best to use it regularly as weeds tend to return. It will take a little time to see the results but it does work.

If you prefer ready-made options, here are some natural, glyphosate-free weed killers available for purchase:

- Natural Armor Weed Killer: A vinegar-based, biodegradable option that kills on contact. It's effective and it will look like you took a torch to your weeds. You can find this on Amazon or pretty much any local retailer.
- Green Gobbler: Another vinegar-based solution. This
 one has excellent ratings and it will obliterate weeds in
 a safe, effective way.

2. Invest in Efficient Weeding Tools

Manual weeding can be made easier with the right tools. One highly recommended option is:

Grampa's Weeder: This stand-up weed puller allows
you to remove weeds without bending or kneeling,
making the task less strenuous. It features a 45-inch
handle and a steel four-claw head, ideal for pulling out
deep-rooted weeds. This thing really works. It's best
for Dandelions and a lot of the weeds we get here on
the plains. You can find it at Ace Hardware or on
Amazon and it will save you a ton of time.

3. Consider Professional Weeding Services

For those who prefer to delegate yard maintenance, hiring a local landscaping company for bi-weekly weeding can be a convenient solution and a great way to take this off your plate. The average cost for weeding services ranges from \$50 to \$210, depending on the size of your property and the extent of the weed problem.

Regular professional maintenance ensures that weeds are kept in check, contributing to the overall appearance and health of our community. Price out a few and you might be surprised how economical this option can be.

Maintaining weed-free properties enhances the beauty of our neighborhood and reflects our collective pride in our community. Whether you choose to tackle weeds yourself or hire professionals, your efforts make a significant difference.

During April 2025 the Design Review Committee met twice, April 7th and 21st. Over the course of the month the Committee reviewed a total of 49 requests.
